BRIEF HISTORY OF WESTERN SUPER-X

Western Cartridge Co. of East Alton Illinois first introduced the Super-X brand of cartridges in Jan.1931. They were first produced in short, short hollow point, long rifle, long rifle hollow point, WRF and WRF hollow point. In March 1931, long and long hollow point were introduced. Product codes were first seen in 1935. EXTRA CLEAN WAX COATED in red on the top of the box started in 1937. In 1941, Western introduced the CLAY TARGET shot cartridge with a new product code of K 1268R. The red Western logo on the bottom of the box ended in late 1941.

In 1946, Western Cartridge Co. became a Division of Olin Industries. Also in 1946, long hollow point was dropped from the product line. In Jan. 1947, WRF hollow point was dropped from the product line, and product code K 1268R was changed from CLAY TARGET to long rifle shot. The last name used on the boxes was Winchester-Western Division, Olin Mathieson-Chemical Corporation, this came in 1955.

In 1960, one of the longest running box labels came to an end. The top of these boxes did not change much since 1931 but some of the fine print did---- pay close attention to detail when you are collecting these boxes.

There are 254 different Super-X boxes in this catalog 1 know there are more out there so keep looking . No one has them all.
